New Course Offerings

Law 566 Advanced Labour Law – Winter Term

The seminar will explore key issues in labour and employment law. The seminar format will provide a flexible blend of directed class discussion, guest speakers and student engagement.

Pre-requisite: Law 560 Labour Law OR Law 567 Employment. Students with relevant background courses acquired outside the law school may also be admitted with the permission of the instructor.

3 credits, seminar, winter term

Method of Evaluation: Participation 20%; presentation 20%; paper 60%

Law 304 Public Health Law – Winter Term

Public Health Law has emerged recently as a distinct field, as the threat of contagious diseases such as SARS has grown with globalization, and as tobacco, food and drug-related illnesses, and the environment have been recognized as significant factors affecting human health. This course examines the role of law in promoting public health and its core value of social justice. Collective protections such as those found in the revised International Health Regulations will be examined in relation to individual rights, including rights to the benefits of such health promotion activities. By analyzing such questions as mandatory immunization, advertising limitations, compulsory disclosure of personal information, quarantine and the use of emergency powers to counter biological warfare, the course explores the intersection of health, law and policy, provides a foundation of legal understanding of Canadian and global health law, and assesses the legal role in promoting the fair and equitable conditions necessary for public health.

3 credits, seminar, winter term

Scheduling: Thursdays from 2:30-5:30 pm in the Winter Term in MAC 515

Method of Evaluation: Paper worth 85% of the grade, plus focus notes and class contribution for the remainder of the grade.

He currently teaches courses in negotiations, cross-cultural management, ethics, domestic and international business law and entrepreneurship at the business school. NB There is a fee for this course of \$40 for required course materials that the instructor will provide to students.</p>
<p>Law 540 Public International Law Ms. Allison Mitchell, a lawyer for Global Affairs Canada, joins us in the classroom here at Queen’s Law this fall. She co-taught this course with Prof. Lamp at the BISC this past spring. She has co-taught an Advanced Int’l Law course at the Univ. of Ottawa on several occasions. International law is her area of expertise and she looks forward to sharing her knowledge and passion for international law with her students.</p>
